



#### From the Editor

Several months ago I recommended that all mobile home owners within the resorts at Lake Berryessa who pay property tax to Napa County request that their tax be eliminated due to the Bureau of Reclamation's Record of Decision. The ROD requires that all mobile homes and trailers within the resorts be removed - effectively requiring their demolition. This has driven the value of these properties to zero. Almost no one has been able to sell their places except for a very few unique situations.

Apparently the County Assessor's Office was then bombarded with these requests. But rather than assist the people who are having their property completely devalued, plus being required to pay their own demolition costs, the Napa County Assessor has stonewalled these taxpayers with administrative and procedural meanderings. The latest response is printed below.

Mr. Tuteur refers to some mythical Removal Plan being prepared by the BOR, as if it has some effect on the present value of the property in question. The only "Removal Plan" for the mobile homeowners is already specified in the June, 2006 ROD - "Get out and take your stuff with you, and if you can't take it, destroy it." Get real - the mobile homes are now worth nothing! Why does the County want to squeeze the last few dollars it can out of folks who have lost everything?

The following letter from the Assessor was accompanied by the helpful and only marginally threatening County document: UNDERSTAND-ING LIENS AND HOW TO AVOID THEM.

Reclamation's declared policy of requiring the removal of these homes from Federal land at the Lake.

I have contacted the Bureau of Reclamation to ascertain the timing of the required removal. I understand that the Removal Plan is still in preparation. Pending the publication of that plan, it is my understanding that the existing homes may continue to be used until the deadline for their removal.

The homes at Pleasure Cove Resort are a special case and I am dealing with those owners separately. I am waiting for more information from the Bureau as to the dates when certain actions occurred at Pleasure

Until I have the final Removal Plan document, I cannot make a determination as to whether a reduction in value has taken place or the amount of that reduction. I understand that at least one brand-new manufactured home has been installed at one of the resorts in recent months.

I have made it clear to those owners who have contacted me that they should pay the first installment of the 2006-2007 taxes on their home prior to the delinquency date of December 11. I will contact all 218 owners with our decision prior to the second installment of taxes going delinquent on April 10, 2007. Failure to pay both installments of taxes will result in a lien being placed by the tax collector after June 30, 2007 against the owner of the manufactured home. Attached is an article on

#### Regional Water Quality Board Extends Sewer Hook-Up Ban

There will be no new sewer hook-ups in the Berryessa Highlands for the forseeable future. In September, the board issued a draft sewer connection ban on the 500-plus homes in the district, a move that followed up on a 1996 enforcement order. The board decided last week to extend the connection ban into perpetuity until the district cleans up its act.

That effectively bars all but five people who were close to completing their permits to build new homes in the district. About a dozen potential homebuilders had applied for building permits, but there were an unknown number of other potential buildeers who were not vet listed in building records.

Per knowledgeable sources, the ban will extend until the local district completes all necessary upgrades. This may take from 2 to 4 years since the required financing will be through a bond issue which is only now in the planning stages.

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
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

Finally the lake is turning and the fish are getting very active. Trout and salmon are on the top if you troll any lure that has a little wobble and goes down between two feet and eight feet you are going to get fish. You can see



boils all over the lake but on Sunday afternoon as the sun was going down I watched about twenty to thirty good size bass herd the shad into a ball and just feed right thru them. Anything I threw at them that resembled a large shad was hit immediatley.

My wife hooked on to an eighteen inch small mouth bass which weighed a little over three pounds and was loaded with shad. We did have a few hits on plastics but the real action was on reaction baits. This should be the hottest three weeks for topwater fishing. We are going into a full moon and the water is cooling down so all signs are good for some great fishing ahead. #### "Why doesn't a spider get stuck on its own web?"

Over the years, three explanations for this phenomenon have surfaced. The first invokes an oil, secreted by the spider, that serves as an anti-stick agent. The problem with this hypothesis is that such an oil has yet to be discovered.

The second scenario is based on the diversity of silks. Many webs include strands made of silks that are much less sticky than the others are. The non-sticky strands appear in the hub of the web, the radial spokes and the threads by which the web hangs from plants or other supports. Some researchers have thus posited that the arachnids use only these strands when navigating their webs. If you watch them in action, however, you see will see that although they do seem to prefer the non-sticky strands, the spiders are able to move around freely, touching many of the strands, including the very sticky ones that spiral out from the hub.

The third explanation appears to solve the sticky-strand problem. In short, the legs of at least some spiders feature a disengaging mechanism that enables the arachnid to detach itself instantly from a sticky strand. This mechanism involves a clever anatomical adaptation. Each leg ends in a pair of "walking claws" that grasp vegetation, among other functions, but a third claw collaborates with associated spiny, elastic hairs to detach the leg from a sticky web strand. This third claw grasps the strand, pulls it against the elastic hairs, and pulls them further, cocking the mechanism. When the claw relaxes, the hairs rebound vigorously, throwing the strand away and springing the leg free.

## \*\*\*\*\*\* Easy Deviled Eggs

Put cooked egg yolks in a zip lock bag. Seal, mash till they are all broken up. Add remainder of ingredients, reseal, keep mashing it up mixing thoroughly, cut the tip of the baggy, squeeze mixture into egg. Just throw bag away when done easy clean up.

But I'm not sure I want to squeeze, grab, strip, or toss any more juicy clusters of grapes for awhile.



#### The First Thanksgiving in 1621 - Myth, Legend, and Fact

Few people realize that the Pilgrims did not celebrate Thanksgiving the next year, or any year thereafter, though some of their descendants later made a "Forefather's Day" that usually occurred on December 21 or 22. Several Presidents, including George Washington, made one-time Thanksgiving holidays. In 1827, Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale began lobbying several Presidents for the instatement of Thanksgiving as a national holiday, but her lobbying was unsuccessful until 1863 when Abraham Lincoln finally made it a national holiday with his 1863 Thanksgiving Proclamation.

Today, our Thanksgiving is the fourth Thursday of November. This was set by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1939 (approved by Congress in 1941), who changed it from Abraham Lincoln's designation as the last Thursday in November (which could occasionally end up being the fifth Thursday and hence too close to Christmas for businesses). But the Pilgrims' first Thanksgiving began at some unknown date between September 21 and November 9, most likely in very early October. The date of Thanksgiving was probably set by Lincoln to somewhat correlate with the anchoring of the Mayflower at Cape Cod, which occurred on November 21, 1620.

There are only two contemporary accounts of the 1621 Thanksgiving: First is Edward Winslow's account, which he wrote in a letter dated December 12, 1621.

"Our corn [i.e. wheat] did prove well, and God be praised, we had a good increase of Indian corn, and our barley indifferent good, but our peas not worth the gathering, for we feared they were too late sown. They came up very well, and blossomed, but the sun parched them in the blossom. Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together after we had gathered the fruit of our labors. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with a little help beside, served the company almost a week. At which time, amongst other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and among the rest their greatest king Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five deer, which they brought to the plantation and bestowed on our governor, and upon the captain and others. And although it be not always so plentiful as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."

The second description was written about twenty years after the fact by William Bradford in his "History Of Plymouth Plantation". It prompted a greater American interest in the history of the Pilgrims, which eventually led to Lincoln's decision to make Thanksgiving a holiday. It is also in this account that the Thanksgiving turkey tradition is founded.

"They began now to gather in the small harvest they had, and to fit up their houses and dwellings against winter, being all well recovered in health and strength and had all things in good plenty. For as some were thus employed in affairs abroad, others were exercising in fishing, about cod and bass and other fish, of

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The following is a fairly complete list of the foods available to the Pilgrims during the three-day Thanksgiving harvest celebration. As can be seen in the above two quotations, the only foods specifically mentioned by the Pilgrims are: "corn" (wheat, by the Pilgrims usage of the word), Indian corn, barley, peas, "fowl" (Bradford says "waterfowl"), five deer, fish (namely bass and cod), and wild turkey.

#### Foods Available to the Pilgrims for their 1621 Thanksgiving

FISH: cod, bass, herring, shad, bluefish, and lots of eel.

SEAFOOD: clams, lobsters, mussels, and small quantities of oysters

BIRDS: wild turkey, goose, duck, crane, swan, partridge, and other miscellaneous waterfowl; they were also known to have occasionally eaten eagles (which "tasted like mutton" according to Winslow in 1623.)

OTHER MEAT: venison (deer), possibly some salt pork or chicken.

GRAIN: wheat flour, Indian corn and corn meal; barley (mainly for

FRUITS: raspberries, strawberries, grapes, plums, cherries, blueberries, gooseberries (dried since they were not in season).

VEGETABLES: small quantity of peas, squashes, pumpkins, beans

NUTS: walnuts, chestnuts, acorns, hickory nuts, ground nuts

HERBS and SEASONINGS: onions, leeks, strawberry leaves, currants, sorrel, yarrow, carvel, brooklime, liverwort, watercress, and flax; from England they brought seeds and probably planted radishes, lettuce, carrots, onions, and cabbage. Olive oil in small quantities may have been brought over, though the Pilgrims had to sell most of their oil and butter before sailing, in order to stay on budget.

OTHER: maple syrup, honey; small quantities of butter, Holland cheese; and eggs.

Some perhaps startling omissions from the authentic Thanksgiving menu

Ham. (The Pilgrims most likely did not have pigs with them).

Sweet Potatoes - Potatoes - Yams. (These had not yet been introduced to New England).

Corn on the cob. (Indian corn was only good for making cornmeal, not eating on the cob).

Popcorn. (Contrary to popular folklore, popcorn was not introduced at the 1621 Thanksgiving. Indian corn could only be half-popped, and this wouldn't have tasted very good.)

Cranberry sauce. (Cranberries were available, but sugar was not.)

Pumpkin Pie: (They probably made a pumpkin pudding of sorts, sweetened by honey or syrup, which would be like the filling of a pumpkin pie, but there would be no crust or whipped topping.)

"While we're projecting a modest decline in the median price of a home, over the long term, residential real estate in California has been and will continue to be a solid investment. Since 1968, the long-term average price appreciation is 9.1 percent."

The anticipated slowdown that began in October 2005 was heightened by dual natural disasters in the Gulf Coast, a significant drop in consumer confidence, rising energy and raw materials costs, and a series of Federal Reserve interest rate hikes that began in June 2004. Fixed-rate mortgages also hit and passed the psychological threshold of 6 percent, while adjustable-rate mortgages passed 5 percent, ultimately causing a decline in affordability. Affordability concerns also will continue to constrain sales for many households in California throughout 2007, especially for first-time home buyers."

#### **Does Damp Weather Make Arthritis Pain Worse?**

Despite the commonly held notion that dampness contributes to joint aches, decades of medical research show no objective relation between arthritis severity and weather. Dampness, decreases in barometric pressure and high humidity are characteristics that some people believe contribute to flares in arthritis pain, but similar environmental changes experienced during other situations do not seem to affect sufferers one way or the other. For instance, arthritis patients do not experience dramatic increases in symptoms when bathing or swimming. Patients easily tolerate greater swings in pressure during a plane ride than would occur during a storm.

Still, no past study investigating the link between weather and arthritic pain is flawless; research has neither totally ruled out nor established a connection. Evidence of a causal link requires dispassionate observation wherein neither clinicians nor patients know what exposure is active. Clinicians and patients would have to ignore weather - a difficult task.

Studies suggest people see patterns even where none exist. By chance, some

rainy days will be followed by pain, entrenching the belief in a connection. Ultimately, such beliefs reveal more about the workings of the mind than those of the body.

#### Why is spider silk so strong?

Spider silk is not a single, unique material-different species produce various kinds of silk. Some possess as many as seven distinct kinds of glands, each of which produces a different silk.

Why so many kinds of silk? Each kind plays particular roles. All spiders make so-called dragline silk that functions in part as a lifeline, enabling the creatures to hang from ceilings. And it serves as a constant connection to the web, facilitating quick escapes from danger. Dragline silk also forms the radial spokes of the web; bridgeline silk is the first strand, by which the web hangs from its support; yet another silk forms the great spiral.

The different silks have unique physical prop-

erties such as strength, toughness and elasticity, but all are very strong com-ripple of compressed molecules moves up away from the drum. Meanwhile, pared to other natural and synthetic materials. Dragline silk combines toughness and strength to an extraordinary degree. A dragline strand is several times stronger than steel, on a weight-for-weight basis, but a spider's dragline is only about one-tenth the diameter of a human hair. The movie Spider-Man drastically underestimates the strength of silk—real dragline silk would not need to be nearly as thick as the strands deployed by our web-swinging hero in the

Dragline silk is a composite material comprised of two different proteins, each containing three types of regions with distinct properties. One of these forms an amorphous (noncrystalline) matrix that is stretchable, giving the silk elasticity. When an insect strikes the web, the stretching of the matrix enables the web to absorb the kinetic energy of the insect's flight. Embedded in the amorphous portions of both proteins are two kinds of crystalline regions that toughen the silk. Although both kinds of crystalline regions are tightly pleated and resist stretching, one of them is rigid. It is thought that the pleats of the less rigid crystalline regions not only fit into the pleats in the rigid crystals but that they also interact with the amorphous areas in the proteins, thus anchoring the rigid crystals to the matrix. The resulting composite is strong, tough, and yet


#### **Mental Workout - Is Thinking Exercise?**

Need to lose some flab? Sit your big butt down with a math book—and feel the burn. The human brain is a 24-hour workhorse. While you're thinking, millions of neurons fire messages back and forth to each other and to the various tissues in the body. These neurons need fuel, consuming a full 75 percent of the blood sugar from the liver and 20 percent of the body's total used oxygen.

Here's how your neurons feed: Astrocytes—the cells near the capillary walls in your brain—suck energy-rich glucose from the bloodstream and convert it into a form that the neurons can soak up. The neurons then use it to fuel the production of neurotransmitters and, eventually, conscious thought. "The more energy an area of the brain wants, the more glucose that part of the brain will break down," explains neurologist Harry Chugani of the Children's Hospital of Michigan. "So yes, if you're thinking really hard and really struggling with your thoughts, the neurons in the frontal lobes of your brain will be burning a lot more glucose."

Simply to survive, your brain requires a tenth of a calorie per minute. Compare

this with a walk to the doughnut shop, when your body burns approximately four calories a minute. Kickboxing zaps 10 calories a minute. And when you're hunched over a crossword puzzle? Your brain is blasting through a respectable 1.5 calories a minute. Pass the Cheetos.



In order to understand how helium has this effect on a voice, it is helpful to first consider how sound waves form and travel, as well as some basic properties of gases.

Sound waves are formed by the vibration of something (a drum-skin or your vocal chords, for instance) in a medium such as air. In the case of a drum, as one strikes its skin, it vibrates up and down. As it moves up, it pushes against the gas molecules of the air, forcing them upward against other molecules. The gas molecules are compressed together and this

the drum skin moves down and back up again, resulting in another compression. This moving series of compressions is a sound wave, and the distance between them is known as the wavelength.

All gas samples have the same number of molecules per unit volume at a given pressure and temperature, whether the gas is helium or nitrogen (the primary constituent of air). But not all gas molecules have the same mass. Nitrogen (and thus air) has a mass roughly seven times greater than that of helium. Nitrogen is thus denser than helium and sound waves travel through it more slowly than they do in helium. At 20 degrees Celsius, for example, sound travels at 927 meters a second through helium, but only at 344 meters a second

Like the vibration of a drum or a violin string, the vibration frequency of the vocal cords is independent of the type of gas that surrounds them. Whereas the velocity of the sound waves is faster in helium (and the wavelength greater), the frequency remains unchanged because it is determined by the vibrating vocal cords. Rather the timbre, or quality, of the sound changes in helium: listen closely next time and you will notice that a voice doesn't become squeaky but instead sounds more like Donald Duck. It is the lesser density of the heli-

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
